Executive Summary

Introduction:

Raj-Ratna Shresthi-Shri Nanjibhai Kalidas Mehta Arya Kanya Vidyalaya Trust managed Gurukul Mahila Arts and Commerce College is a Grant-in-Aid college affiliated to Bhakta Kavi Narsinh Mehta University, Junagadh. This institute of higher education, which was established in 1966, is a non-profit establishment offering undergraduate courses in the faculties of Arts (B.A. with English, Hindi, Gujarati, Economics & Home-Science & M.A. – English) and Commerce (B.Com.with Accounting and Computer-Science) & M.Com. with Accounting – Both Gujarati & English Medium). It is located in Jubilee, Bokhira, Porbandar, in Gujarat & caters specifically to the students coming from the remote, rural and far-flung sections of the society.

The Mission of the Institute is to achieve excellence in academic and co-curricular education. Its emphasis is on sound teaching & learning through value-based education. The college believes in national integration and has an open admission policy, encouraging enrollment of girls irrespective of income, class, colour, caste, creed, region or religion. At present the college has strength of about 647 students coming from all the sections of the society.

As such, we have a teaching staff of 14 Permanent and as many as 23 contractual/visiting Lecturers, who are imparting instructions in various disciplines. The overall result maintained by the college is 91% in the University exams. Among the Administrative Staff we have 11 personnel who take care of maintaining the entire College apart from executing official duties assigned to them.

Criteria wise Summary

Curricular Aspects:

Gurukul Mahila Arts & Commerce College, Porbandar is affiliated to Bhakta Kavi Narsinh Mehta University, Junagadh since 2016 and offers 02 UG & 02 PG programmes. The curriculum of the institution has been designed by the affiliating university. At present the college has 647 students and 14 (Permanent) + 23 (Contractual/Visiting) = 37 faculty members. To ensure the effective curriculum delivery, the regular courses are supplemented by need based 23 short term/add-on/Skill-based courses. Academic Calendar is prepared well in advance. Teachers prepare lesson plans and also offer a model answer bank by way of econtent to all Students. Teachers are encouraged to use I.C.T aids and innovative teaching techniques apart from traditional teaching methods. Seminars & Educational visits are organized. Guest lectures are arranged for career guidance. The cross cutting issues like Gender, Environment and sustainability, Human values and professional Ethics are integrated in curriculum. The college believes in healthy environment for all students. The college has included Society for Creation of Opportunity through Proficiency in English (SCOPE) and Environmental studies for first year Arts and Commerce students and incorporated internship, project/fieldwork as a part of comprehensive continuous internal evaluation. Various committees like Students' Council, Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Committee take care of student issues. The college conducts various awareness programmes through NSS, YRC, NCC, Samudayik Sevadhara, Electoral Literacy Club & Educational Movie Club to instil human values. The Eco Club ensures that plantations on the campus are well maintained. The college has undertaken the unique activity of transforming the entire zone into a Green belt. Feedback mechanism, both oral/written – both offline & online is obtained from all the stakeholders.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation:

GMC admits students coming from all the sections of the society, irrespective of caste, creed, colour, race or religion. As such, 1347 students were enrolled in the last five years and 82.01 of seats have been filled as per the reservation policy. The Institution assesses the learning levels of the students based on the HSC results and through induction programmes.

Teaching—learning methods adopted by the faculty members include Traditional Lecture Method, Experiential Learning Method, Participative Learning method/Project-based Learning, Computer-assisted Learning/ICT Enabled Teaching, Group-Discussion/Problem-Solving/Interactive Method, Blended and Hybrid Learning Method, Innovative Teaching-Learning Method etc. The Teaching — learning activities are made effective through graphic illustrations, chart-Exhibitions and audio-visual lectures. Lessons are taught through Power Point Presentations to make learning interesting besides traditional lecture methods. The teachers have prepared model answer banks along with recorded lectures on specific topics and made available for easy access on the college you tube channel. ICT enabled teaching is followed. The college is conducting summer camps to inculcate valuable job skills among the students. Workshops are arranged on skill development, communicative English, personality development, Indian culture. Advanced learners are encouraged to enrol in MOOC courses. Online submission of assignments is adopted by all the departments of the College. Learning has been made student centric through various methods. As such, the Average teaching experience of the permanent faculty is 18 years and 03 months.

The pass percentage of the students has improved to 91% in the last five years. 867 students appeared of which 743 passed out. The Institute has clearly stated learning outcomes of the Programmes and Courses. Hard Copy of syllabi and Learning Outcomes are available with the departments for ready reference. Website links for the Soft Copy of Curriculum and Learning Outcomes of Programmes and Courses are also uploaded on the Institution website for ready reference. The importance of the learning outcomes has been communicated to the teachers in every IQAC Meeting and Departmental Meetings.

Online feedback is periodically conducted for the teaching-learning process and the analysis report is shared with all concerned.

Research, Innovations and Extension:

The institution has created an Eco system for innovation and for transfer of knowledge. The college Research Development committee (RDC) encourages the faculty members and the students to undertake Major/Minor research projects. The institution has had 04 recognized research guides - Dr. Anupam R. Nagar, Dr. Manhar K. Goswami, Dr. Nayan D. Tank & Dr. Mrinalini Thaker for Ph.D programmes in the last five years. So far 15+ Ph.D scholars have been awarded Ph.d. degree under them; The institution has conducted 03 International seminars & 41 Conferences/ Workshops/ Webinars/ Seminars in the last five years so far; 47 publications in national and international journals were published; 14 papers were presented in national and international seminars by faculty members and 33 chapters/books have been published; 22 awards have been bestowed to the Institution for outstanding extension activities. The college also invites eminent researchers and resource persons to deliver special lectures on research to improve the empirical and experimental knowledge of research for both faculty members and students.

In order to promote innovation the Institution has been organizing an Expo-fest titled as Gurukuliyam since the last couple of years. 155 students have successfully completed their Internships and over 97 students have submitted their project/field reports in the last couple of years. Students generally submit their assignments through emails and even teachers share their reading material via emails and official whatsapp chat groups.

The Institution has 02 NSS units, 01 YRC Unit (which comprises of 200 volunteers) & 01 NCC unit; 01 Electoral Literacy Club, 01 Eco-Club; 01 Educational Movie Club; Innovation Club to develop the students'

personality and social responsibility. The students also engage in extension activities like village adoption and school adoption and conduct various awareness programmes, rallies, health camps and also provide meals to the poor school students. So far over 69 events have been conducted in the past five years. Annual Awards have instituted for *Saptadhara* & NSS/NCC/Library/Institutional Values units of the institution.

The Institution has been on the fore-front on the social responsibility aspect as well. It has signed as many as 22 Memorandum of Understandings (MoUs) with Academic institutions and NGOs both at the state/national and International levels.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

The Institution has good infrastructure facilities. All in all it has 16 spacious class rooms with good ventilation, fan, light, benches and green/black/white boards, Notice/Display-Boards & 05 well-equipped laboratories - Digital Education and Learning Laboratory (DELL); Food & Nutrition Lab., NSQF-Sewing Machine Operator/Clothing & Textile lab., NSQF-Beauty & Wellness Lab. & UGC-Computer Laboratory; 01 Assembly Hall with seating capacity of 700 and an audio-visual conference room with a seating capacity of 150 students. All the sections - office and library are provided with internet facility; Five UPS are installed for uninterrupted power supply in the Office and Laboratories.

The library consists of 58301 books, 100+ e-journals, 27 Magazines and 479 e-books. The Trust has a college hostel with well furnished 19 rooms, 01 Assembly Hall, 01 Havan-kund, 03 Computer-Systems (with internet connectivity) with a total strength of 80 inmates. There are various other common facilities like separate rooms for NSS/NCC, Sports, vehicle parking stand, canteen, RO water system and 01 RWH. The college takes care of the physical and mental health of the students by providing the required indoor and outdoor sports facilities. Three courts are available. The college has made yoga and meditation as regular practice for hostel students. The institution also has adequate facilities for cultural activities. The College has developed the Central Library as an Incubation Centre for Research. As of today the Library is fully automated and has good quantity of quality reference books and reading materials for competitive examinations. The College has been updating its IT facilities at regular intervals. It also has standard operating procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic sports facilities and buildings.

In addition, the Institution has taken measures for safety and security by appointing security guards in the campus and also installed 32 Close Circuit Television Cameras (CCTV); fire-fighting equipment has been installed; RWH and compost pit are made available on the premises.

Student Support and Progression:

The college offers sufficient number of facilities for student support and progression. The College has a 54-member Student council and representation of students on academic and administrative committees of the Institution. In addition, the College offers support, in terms of providing well-furnished Hostel facility, Canteen, Transport services, computer-systems, campus wi-fi and cycles.

The College helps to avail Government scholarship. The college has facilitated scholarship for 1711 economically poor, underprivileged, and meritorious students in the last five years; 49.58% students have progressed to higher studies; 14 Students and 04 teachers have qualified for NET/SLET examinations. The College is also having the Placement cell in which over 105 students have been placed in various companies,

banks and institutions; 3480 students have been the beneficiaries of the skill enhancement courses so far. The CCDC (Career counselling and development centre) of the college guides the students on career opportunities. The cell provides coaching and training to the students by inviting external experts and resource persons. In the last five years the **Preparatory Course for Competitive Examinations** (PCCE) has been conducted for the students and more than 2017 students have been the beneficiaries of the Career Counselling and Guiding sessions in the last five years.

The college also promotes the cultural activities of the students. The college has as many as 07 Study-circles & 07 Societies (Saptadharas) in which students are given a platform to exhibit their talents. They conduct various competitions such as, elocution contest, essay writing, poetry composition etc. In addition, the Talent Morning Programme, Guru-Poornina celebrations, Independence-Day celebrations, Teachers' day celebrations, Gandhi Jayanti celebrations, Navratri celebrations, Republic Day celebrations and Annual programme give students the platform to participate and show-case their latent talents. Towards the end of the term, the College felicitates College Toppers with the Gold Medals & gives award to the Outstanding Student of the year for Academics and Co-curricular activities & for Regularity to the students.

The Institution had established an Alumni association since the year 2007. The Alumni association meetings with parents and staff are annually conducted in the college. Eminent persons holding high positions in the district and talented alumni are invited to college to motivate students and provide counseling for the achieving career opportunities. The Alumni discusses with stake holders on various academic matters and obtains feedback. On the basis of feedback obtained from alumni, the college modifies and updates all other programmes. Many among the Alumni come forward to conduct campus interviews for Banks, IT companies and other organizations for providing job opportunities.

Governance, Leadership and Management:

The Institution has proactive leadership in tune with the vision and mission of the Institution. The Institution has been promoting rural women empowerment through quality education. The Institution is encouraging the enrolment of the first generation women learners from nearby villages and under privileged sections of the society. The Institution provides operational autonomy in academic performance. The college motivates to organize co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for the holistic development of the students.

Academic Calendar is chalked out before the beginning of the Semester. The college has prepared a perspective plan which incorporates agenda for over all development of the college. The organizational structure of the institution includes Governing Body, administrative setup. The Principal of the college is assisted by the Heads of the Departments in academic administration. The college office maintains the statutory records pertaining to students as well as teaching and non-teaching staff. The Principal of the College conducts periodical meetings with teaching and non-teaching staff for planning and execution. The college administration conducts periodical meetings of various bodies/committees and discusses various issues and accordingly resolutions are passed. The college has initiated welfare scheme for teaching and administrative staff.

Teachers are encouraged to publish articles in journals and books. Teaching staff is granted duty leave for participating in workshop, seminars and conferences. Faculty Development Programmes are conducted annually to improve the quality of teaching and learning process.

The management has appointed auditor for internal audit of the accounts. External audit is carried out by the office of the Commissioner of Higher Education, Govt. of Gujarat. The major resources of the institution are student admission fees and limited grants from UGC. In addition, the Trust has spent over 2 Crs. for repairs, renovation and maintenance of the Infrastructure.

The IQAC is taking efforts for enhancement in quality and sustenance in academic and administrative activities. The IQAC comprising of the Principal and all HoDs evaluate the academic facilities, performance of the departments and give suggestions for further improvement and quality enhancement in academic activities, teaching-learning process, research, administration, curricular and extra-curricular activities. The Annual Self-Appraisal reports are prepared by the Principal to analyze the performance of the faculty members. The performance appraisal system aims to bring out qualitative output in academic performance and make suggestions accordingly. So far the IQAC has conducted over 15 meetings with various stake holders in the last five years.

Institutional Values and Best Practices:

Gurukul Mahila Arts and Commerce College (GMC) was founded in the year 1966 to inculcate ethical and moral values in students. These ethics and morals form the undercurrent of every subject taught at the College. This helps students develop a wholesome and balanced personality, one where academic competence is supplemented with good character. This holistic development of students can only be possible in an environment that encourages the development of the student's mind, body and spirit. To facilitate this, the Trust has an optional residential policy for students. However, it is an essential ingredient for the Institution's Values-based Integral Education to achieve its objective of transformation. The environment is similar to the ancient Indian Gurukula system of education, in a modern context. Teachers and students live and grow together in an atmosphere of mutual trust and unity. This helps students develop a wholesome and balanced personality, one where academic competence is supplemented with good character.

The college has made systemic efforts for solid waste and liquid management. The institution encourages students to utilize the pedestrian friendly surroundings of the college. The college is planning to make its office paper less. The college organizes national festivals to inculcate patriotism among students. The Institution is maintaining transparency in financial, academic and administrative matters. The college is imparting value education through prayer, yagna, ved-gaan, *Saptadhara* and study circle activity.

The college has planted good amount of trees including medicinal plants. The college has set up an eco-club to promote and monitor green practices in the campus. The Institution has a garden and all efforts are made to keep the campus clean and green. Adequate water supply system is provided and over 1500 plantations have been done in the last five years. Solar-Roof-top, Solar-water-heater, CFL lamps are replaced instead of energy bulbs and tube lights for less energy consumption. Students are advised to switch off fans, lights, computers and other electrical connections in the laboratories when they are not used. Batteries and UPS are installed to minimize the utilization of conventional energy. UPS batteries are recharged and repaired. Unused UPS are exchanged by the suppliers. Nearly 300 *Mehndi* saplings and 300 *Neem* plants have been planted in and around the college campus to neutralize carbon emission. The NSS/NCC volunteers also plant saplings in the campus during the Tree plantation programme.

Institutional preparedness for NEP The Institution encourages the students to participate in various inter-departmental activities that are multidisciplinary / Interdisciplinary in nature as Quiz competition, Role-Play, Spoken English course, Elocution, Sports, Music, Dance and Creative writing competitions; Webinars & Symposium. Since its inception the Study-Circle (William Shakespeare Study Circle, Premchand Study-Circle, Premanand Study-Circle, Home-Science Study-Circle, Adam Smith Study-Circle, Chanakya StudyCircle, Ratan-Tata Study-Circle) and Saptadhara (Geet-Sangeet-Nrutya-dhara, Natyadhara, Sarjanatmak Abhivyakti dhara, Gyan dhara, Vyayam Khel-Kood-Yogdhara, Rang-Kala-Kaushalya dhara, Samudayik Seva dhara) activities have been addressing issues that are interdisciplinary in nature. Students irrespective of 1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary: their enrolled faculties actively participate in all the academic, curricular and co-curricular events of the institution. In fact, it would not be an exaggeration to say that both the Study-Circle activities and Saptdhara activities have contributed immensely in bringing forth the latent skills of the students. Furthermore three Departments of English, Hindi & Gujarati stand out in particular as they organize week-long multidisciplinary literary events titled as Literary fest, Hindi Pakhvada and Matrubhasha Gaurav Saptah (International Mother Tongue Week) in which students perform and participate from every department/faculty. And to top it all, this year the Institution had organized "Gurukuliyam" a trade-expo festival that aimed at giving a hands-on experience to the students. Over 9000 people from the town bore witness to the event. As ours is an HEI that is affiliated to Bhakta Kavi Narsinh Mehta university, Junagadh, we are bound by the guidelines prescribed for the Curriculum. This year the University had asked for various details regarding "Academic bank of Credits" and 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC): all relevant student details have been added in the BKNMU-ABC-Portal. In fact out of 615, 522 students of our College have their respective Academic Bank of Credits as of date. 3. Skill development: The Institution in order to encourage the students organizes various skill-development programmes all round the year. During 2023-24 Online Quizzes and

various competitive activities were organized to test the multifaceted skills of the students. Apart from these hands-on-training sessions, the students of GMC are offered as many as 23 add-on/skill-based courses to harness their latent talents. For ex., Department of English offers Spoken English, English Proficiency Programme as Short-term courses and SCOPE as an Add-on Programme; Department of Hindi offers a term-end module titled as Preparatory Course for Competitive Examinations & Hindi Grammar; Department of Gujarati offers a Short-term course in Journalism & Gujarati Grammar; Department of Economics offers an Add-on Programme in Organic farming & a Course in Entrepreneurship; Department of Commerce offers a Short-term Certificate Course in Computing (CCC) & TALLY-ERP and Department of Home-Science offers NSQF-Add-on programmes in Beauty & Wellness, Sewing Machine Operator, Pedicure and Manicure, Bakery & Confectionery and Mehndi Classes. Furthermore, a six-month capsule Environment course & SCOPE is offered for all the first year UG students along with a weeklong Workshop on Health & Hygiene; the Cultural Committee of GMC also offers Training in Music, Dance and Theatre all around the year. Accordingly, the qualifying students, among others, display their talents in the GMC-Talent-Morning Programme & Annual Programme.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The institution has deep roots in the Indian Knowledge Systems. Since its inception in 1966, the Institution has been promoting the integration of IKS in our day-to-day curriculum. All the faculty members of the Institution are adept in Indian languages, Indian Culture and thought. Every day questions related to IKS are asked in the Morning Assembly along with a Thought of the day and Daily Positive News. On occasions skits, mimes and character performances are enacted to leave behind a "strong message". In addition, Gandhi-Vichar-Manan Exam is conducted every year. The Institution's dress-code; every Thursday's Pratah Sandhya Havan; Vedam recitation are some of the key practices that are in synchronicity with Arya Culture and tradition.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Arya Kanya Vidyalaya Trust managed Gurukul Mahila Arts and Commerce College has been rooting for Outcome Based Education since its very inception. Over 30000 students have imbibed the spirit and thought of Indian Culture and Tradition in

this organization and are today placed in highly respectable positions all around the world. The yearning of Pujya Bapuji (Raj-ratna Shreshthi Shri Nanjibhai Kalidas Mehta) to prepare strong, committed and responsible students has found execution in the last eight decades. The Mahamantra of reaching out to the remotest and far-flung unprivileged sections of the society, specifically the girls, has been in the process of realization 'here' and 'now'. In addition, since 2017, the Institution has been offering Add-on and Skill-based courses to ensure the holistic development of the student. The courses, among others, include Spoken English, English Proficiency Programme (EPP), Society for Creation of Opportunity through Proficiency in English (SCOPE), Havan & Vedam Classes, Hindi Grammar, Sankrit Grammar, Journalism, Organic Farming, Sewing Machine Operator, Data-Entry Operator, Beauty and Wellness, Pedicure and Manicure, Tally ERP-09, CCC, Music, Dance and Theatre Training. These courses have helped the students to perform better in their post-graduate programmes and there are many instances when many of our Alumni (following the completion of their PG programme) have come and donned the mantle of a teacher in their own department. There are also others who have excelled in competitive examinations on account of the strong base they received at Gurukul.

6. Distance education/online education:

The institution offers as many as six courses in the distance mode. The Institution is affiliated to Dr Babasaheb Ambedkar Open University, Ahmedabad and has been offering these courses in the distance mode since 2020. As regards Online education, GMC had arranged Online education for all the streams offered during the pandemic period. It is noteworthy to add that TEAM-GMC was fully geared up to reach out to all the students as it actually would have done in the Offline mode. In addition, as many as 250 curricular and co-curricular competitions and activities were also successfully conducted in the Online mode. This year over 50% of the students have enrolled in the Online courses offered @Swayam Portal.

The ELC is also actively involved with the Election department of Porbandar district and do take part in activities of Systematic Voters' Education and Electoral Participation programme (SVEEP) too.

These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of ethical voting, enhancing participation of the under privileged sections of society especially transgender, commercial sex workers, disabled persons, senior citizens, etc.

Yes, the Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process. As such, the institution adopts the curriculum provided by the **Bhakta Kavi Narsinh Mehta University**. Accordingly in keeping with the University guidelines, the Institution's **Time-Table** and **Academic Calendar** is prepared towards the close of the ongoing academic year for the next academic year after receiving inputs from the heads & teachers of the departments. The plan includes the papers to be taught along with the number of credits/hours to be taught.

The Institution has envisaged the University Curriculum to be made practically more relevant through the Introduction of various **Study-Circle activities** that address both the needs of skill development and employment hand-in-hand. For instance the Department of English has the **William Shakespeare Study-Circle**, the Department of Hindi has the **Premchand Study-Circle**, the Department of Gujarati has the **Premanand Study-Circle**, the Department of Economics has the **Adam Smith Study-Circle**, the Department of Home-Science has the **Home-Science Study-Circle**, the Department of Commerce (GM) has the **Chanakya Study-Circle** and the Department of Commerce (EM) has the **Ratan Tata Study-Circle**. All these Study-Circles have an Academic Calendar that includes among others activities as Quizzes, Essaywriting competitions, Elocution-Contests, Poetry-Recitation, Expert lectures, Workshops, Seminars etc. In addition four Departments – English, Hindi, Gujarati and Commerce have unique practices of **Learning by Doing** through the organization of a **Literary-Fest, Hindi Pakhvada, World Mother-Tongue Week and Gurukuliyam Trade-Expo.**

Furthermore to address the needs of employability, the Institution has planned out Add-on, Short-Term and Certificate courses to make the students employment worthy. Courses like Society for Creation of Opportunity through Proficiency in English (SCOPE), English Proficiency Programme (EPP), Environmental Studies (Health & Hygiene), Sanskrit Grammar, Hindi Grammar, Gujarati Grammar, Preparatory Course for Competitive Examinations (PCCE), Journalism, CCC, Tally with GST, Coding, Beauty and Wellness, Manicure & Pedicure, Sewing Machine Operator, Organic Grower and Data-Entry Operator etc. have improved the performance of the students on the placement front as well. This year 1373 students have registered for these courses in the current academic year.

All in all, due emphasis is given to submission of online/offline Assignments, Chart-Exhibition, Project Work, Internship, Oral & ppt. presentation and Group-Discussion. The institution provides necessary infrastructure to encourage the teachers to employ innovative techniques apart from traditional teaching. Educational visits and tours are also organized. Each department sets its programme objectives and outcomes that match with the Institution's vision and mission statement.

As such, the Students' performance in the University examinations defines the effectiveness of the Curriculum delivery and the concrete results of the year long documented planning. And accordingly the students of Gurukul Mahila College have fared outstandingly in the last five years and secured the highest of Ranks and Gold medals in the University Convocation. The cross-cutting issues like Gender, Environment and sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics

etc., find automatic space at GMC when it comes to applying them positively into the curriculum. We believe in maintaining healthy environment for all the students. The College **time-table** includes many of these aspects such as, **SCOPE** (Society for Creation of Opportunity through Proficiency in English) and **Environmental Studies** for First Year Arts & Commerce students.

There are various committees which take care of student issues such as:

- (i) **Grievance Redressal Cell**: The GRC comprises of lady faculty members consisting of one coordinator and one member and also one student representative from each department. We are proud to state that in our college the incidents of harassment of women students are nil due to the strict regimen followed on the campus.
- (ii) **Anti- Ragging Committee**: As per the guidelines of UGC and the University, an Anti-Ragging Committee has been constituted to handle the issues pertaining to ragging. The names of the committee members along with their mobile numbers are displayed on the Notice-Board.
- (iii) **Awareness Programmes to instill human Values**: The college conducts various awareness programmes under NSS, YRC, NCC & Samudayik Seva-dhara that includes among others *Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan*, Blood Donation Programmes, Voting Awareness Programme, Tree Plantation, Health Awareness Programmes etc. to instill human values of fellow-feeling, concern, love, sympathy, empathy etc.
- (iv) **Discipline Committee**: This committee comprises of two faculty members and class representatives. This committee plays an important role in the maintenance of discipline and ethics in the day-to-day functioning of the college as well as during academic & cultural programmes. A register is also maintained to document the grievances and their resolutions.
- (v) **Eco Club:** The Eco Club headed by a teacher with 05 Class-representatives ensure that plantations on the campus are well-maintained and preserved along with periodically having awareness sessions & cleanliness drives on the need to be conscious of our surroundings by keeping it neat and tidy.

In effect, the Institution integrates crosscutting issues through (i) Gender Sensitization: Gender sensitization camps are organized in slums and rural areas of Porbandar district that include, Women's rights and gender equality. The College also annually organizes seminars, conferences, guest lectures, exhibitions, and literary activities that help in gender sensitization. (ii) Environment and Sustainability: The Institution's strong community orientated work culture is based on the Arya Kanya Gurukul sustainable way of life, that involves integration of water quality, air quality, education and healthcare, agriculture and dairy practices, innovation and human values. GMC has pioneered vocational & skill development education by introducing NSQF courses. Water, Sanitation, Waste Management, Environmental and Green Campus are the thrust areas. A Certificate course on Environment studies is included at the First-year UG. (iii) Human Values and Professional Ethics: GMC specially focuses on human values and professional ethics through: Cultural Education (through weekly Havan Sandhya); Daily Quizzes; Village Adoption; Social Service; Co-curricular Activities & Environment Studies. Teaching—learning methods adopted by the faculty members include Traditional Lecture Method, Experiential Learning Method, Participative Learning method/Project-based Learning, Computer-assisted Learning/ICT Enabled Teaching, Group-Discussion/Problem-Solving/Interactive Method, Blended and Hybrid Learning Method, Innovative Teaching-Learning Method etc.

The Teaching – learning activities are made effective through graphic illustrations, chart-Exhibitions and audio-visual lectures. Lessons are taught through Power Point Presentations to make learning interesting besides traditional lecture methods.

Traditional Lecture method: This conventional method is commonly adopted by all the teachers, especially language teachers. This method facilitates the teacher to interpret, explain and revise the content of a text only for better understanding of the subject by the learners.

Experiential learning, Participative learning method/Project-based & Practical learning: The faculty members' foster learning environment by engaging in teaching through experience, Teaching through demonstration, Periodic industrial visits, Organizing exhibitions and conducting quiz. E-Commerce, CCC, Graphic Designing and Banking are the Add on courses imparting experiential learning.

Computer-Assisted Learning/ICT Enabled Teaching:

- ICT enabled teaching includes guest lectures of career counselors and educationists.
- Regular practical sessions.
- Use of LCD projectors for seminars and workshops.
- Use of educational videos
- English proficiency skills training is provided to students during Language lab sessions. Software is effectively used to train students to acquire proficiency in listening, speaking, reading and writing.
- Online reference, lecture talks, motivational talks and web reference support the teaching-learning process.

All the departments provide instructional materials to the students for easy follow-up / understanding the concepts. Learning resources and useful websites are made available in the college website, which serve as a ready link to access the portals of information and gain knowledge.

Group-Discussion/Problem-Solving/Interactive method: The faculty members make learning interactive

with students by motivating student participation in group discussion, problem-solving, role-play, subject quiz, news analysis, educational games, discussion and questions and answers on current affairs.

Blended and Hybrid Learning Method: The faculty members took recourse to this teaching method particularly during the Pandemic period. As students were not permitted to visit the colleges, the teachers learnt the nuances of this teaching methodology and effectively executed their daily duties and responsibilities. A number of Webinars and Workshops were also conducted using this methodology.

Innovative Teaching-Learning Method/Gurukuliyam Expo Fest: An Innovative teaching-learning handson method has been adopted by all the faculties in the form of a Gurukuliyam Expo Fest since 2022. Among others, the Fest serves as a platform to showcase the multifaceted skills of our students. As such, the Fest, coordinated by faculties motivates the students to set up stalls and thereby explore their on-the-job skills and provide excellent networking opportunities to the students.

All the above teaching-learning methodologies ultimately enhance the learning experience of the student at Gurukul Mahila Arts and Commerce College, which eventually finds reflection in the University Results. In fact, the Institution has had as many as four University rankers (Ms. Aditi Dave, Ms. Rupal Bharakhada, Ms. Lakhi Chudasama and Ms. Deepu Karavadra) & One Gold-medalist (Ms. Shweta Kotiya) in the year 2022-23.

Students are made aware of the evaluation process during the Induction programmes at the beginning of the semester. As such, the

University stipulates conducting three internal and one external semester-end examination. Of the three Internal exams, the teachers are at liberty to assign written-assignments, conduct written-test, conduct seminars, make power-point presentations, Organize Chart-Exhibitions, Assign Project work/ Case-studies, Conduct educational Field-visits/tours, Submit Research Papers et. al., in keeping with the Internal Assessment Framework/structure prescribed by the University in terms of frequency and mode. As such a maximum period of 05 weeks separates one Internal exam from the next.

Furthermore, the Institute insists on a systemic approach and hence the following practices have been adopted:

- Academic Calendar with CCE Internal Assessment Exam dates.
- Teaching Plan contains evaluation procedures of the college.
- Display of important dates on the College Notice Board & percolating information on the Institute's Official WhatsApp groups.
- Result Analysis is done by the Department after every CCE Test.
- The performance of the students is monitored by the Head of the Department and the necessary feedback is given to the concerned faculty members.
- The Principal conducts department-wise meetings to give necessary feedback for improvement of

students' performance.

- Students should satisfy the eligibility criteria of 75% attendance in each semester to appear for University Examination.
- Internal practical examination of is conducted before the end of every semester for all the Home-Science and Computer-Science practical papers.
- Reappearing/Reassessment: The students are informed well in advance about their Internal exam reassessment schedule (on account of Illness/Sports/NSS/NCC) and are given the provision to re-write the exams or submit their assignments.

In addition, the following Transparency initiatives are taken at the institutional level to make the assessment process more robust and effective:

- Basic eligibility for evaluation process is made known to students through notice boards, Official WhatsApp groups and class counseling.
- The schedule/frequency of internal assessments is communicated to students and faculty at the beginning of the semester through institute Brochure & Academic Calendar.
- Institute notifies evaluation process and related documentation on the notice board; through Official WhatsApp groups; College Brochures and Circulars of the University.
- Staff meetings are conducted periodically with the Principal to review the evaluation process.
- In case of any discrepency of marks necessary alternations are made within the prescribed time limit.
- All Internal-test marks are invariably displayed on the College Notice-Board and Official WhatsApp groups.

Course Outcomes: The courses offered at the Institutional level (BA-English, BA-Hindi, BA-Gujarati, BA-Economics, BA-Home-Science, BCom-Computer-Science and BCom-Accounts) which have very specific outcomes are evaluated keeping a tripartite methodology which includes (a) Indepth analysis of results subject-wise/semester-wise at the department level (b) Indepth analysis of results subject-wise/semester-wise through the University results (c) Analysis of Linguistic proficiency through external agencies as Cambridge University (Knowledge Consortium of Gujarat, Ahmedabad) & Gujarat-Hindi Hindustani Prachar Samiti, Ahmedabad.

Programme Outcomes: For every degree programme, career opportunities are listed out by the institution under the Programme Outcomes. This enables the stakeholders to identify and select the subject of their

choice. Subjects like Languages, Commerce & Economics help the students in learning how to find solutions for problems that meet the specified needs for their cultural, societal and environmental well being. This is followed by modern tool & technique usage, as in Computer Science, which students select and apply. They apply reasoning and understand the impact of the solutions in societal and environmental context. While in the study of languages & literature, they learn to apply ethical principles. They realize that individual and team work function effectively in multidisciplinary settings. They learn to communicate effectively with society and they are able to comprehend and write effective reports. They also make effective presentations and give and receive clear instructions. They understand the importance of critical thinking, social interaction, effective citizenship, ethics and environment and sustainability. Ultimately, they acquire the ability to engage in independent and life-long learning.

Program Specific Outcomes: The stakeholders understand the nature and basic concepts of education. They analyze the relationship between human beings. Based on these outcomes, the stakeholders learn goal-setting, problem solving techniques and decision making. The institution evaluates the stakeholders as Outstanding Student of the year (Academic), Outstanding Student of the year (Co-curricular), Most-Regular Student of the year and Best Library Utilization Award. They are recognized and awarded during the Annual Programme with Awards, Certificates and Mementos. Gold Medals are awarded to the College Toppers in the University Examinations. The Outstanding Students are evaluated on the basis of Academic Performance, Attendance, Behaviour inside the class room, Behaviour on the campus and Extracurricular activities. The program outcomes and program specific outcomes are measured by conducting 3 comprehensive continuous internal examinations in a semester. The attainment of students is also measured by asking spontaneous questions during the lecture.

- GMC-Incubation Centre under the auspices of the College, Central Library has been on the forefront in creating an ecosystem for Innovations among the students and staff. Among others the major Innovative activities conducted at and by the GMC-Granthalaya are Quizzes on memorizing the Cover page of Classics; Book-Cover page making competition; One-minute Library-Game competition; Book-review competition; Rare-Books Exhibition; Cross-word Game competition. The Department of Commerce (English medium) has also adopted a unique and innovative approach to harness the talents of the students through the organization of a two-day Expo-fest titled as Gurukuliyam. Over 20 stalls are set up hand-in-hand with a variety of competitions that are organized, handled and managed by the students themselves.
- Research Policy: The Institution has a well defined Research Policy in place. As such, the institution has a Research Development Committee in place since 2017. Under the auspices of this committee and its IPR policy the Institution has organized as many as 03 International Seminars; 01 State-level Seminar and over 41 Workshops/Webinars in the last five years. In addition, the College has had during the assessment period as many 04 recognized guides Dr. Anupam Nagar, Dr. Nayan Tank, Dr. Manhar Goswami and Dr. Mrinalini Thaker who have guided over 04 students. Under their guidance and the Coordinator of the RDC Dr. Shanti Modhvadia, as many as 08 Research-Aid proposals and 08 Research Projects on various subjects have been submitted to the Knowledge Consortium of Gujarat (KCG), Ahmedabad. The RDC is also taking strides to acquire an ISSN number for its Research Journal Samvid-A Multidisciplinary Journal.
- Indian Knowledge Systems: The institution has deep roots in the Indian Knowledge Systems. Since its inception in 1966, the Institution has been promoting the integration of IKS in our day-to-day curriculum. All the faculty members of the Institution are adept in Indian languages, Indian Culture and thought. Every day questions related to IKS are asked in the Morning Assembly along with a Thought of the day and Daily Positive News. On occasions skits, mimes and character performances are enacted to leave behind a "strong message". The Institution's dress-code; Every Thursday's Sandhya Havan & Sarva-dharma Prarthana; Vedam recitation, Upanayanam samskaar are some of the key practices that are in synchronicity with Arya Culture and tradition.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Outcomes of Extension activities in the neighborhood community in terms of impact and sensitizing the students to social issues for their holistic development during the last five years.

Answer:

To impart and sensitize students to social issues and to move social responsibility from theoretical foundation to practical implementation, the College has NSS, NCC,YRC & a society named *Samudayik Seva Dhara* - Community Services Society (SSD), which consists of 02 faculty members and 5 Class representatives that acts as a facilitator to organize programmes in the village to create awareness among the different villages nearby Bokhira, Khapat, Palakhda, Kolikhada & Kuchhadi (Porbandar).

NSS/NCC Special camp:

The Institution has adopted a village named as *Kolikhada* and the government elementary school situated in the Village. The adopted school is provided assistance in the form of notebooks, pen and pencils. The Programme Officers and the NSS/NCC-volunteers also deliver motivational speeches/talks to inspire the students & staff members.

RRC (Red Ribbon Club):

The NSS Units collaborate with the RRC to instill a sense of fellow-feeling among all the students and understand the importance of leading a healthy life and thereby encouraging Blood-donation and philanthropic activities. Since the last five years the Institute has collaborated with **Asha Children Blood Bank** and has donated over 100 bottles of Blood specifically meant for the Thalassemia patients. The students and staff have been sincerely volunteering for addressing such national causes.

Tree Plantation and Green Gurukul:

The students are encouraged to plant trees and thereby improve the green ambience of the college. This year with support from Saurashtra Cement a beautiful garden was prepared to add to the ambience of the College. In fact, in a period of five years over 1500 plantations have been added to the landscape of Arya Kanya Gurukul Campus.

Yoga Camp:

Every year the Institute celebrates International Yoga Day/week. The practice helps the students in retaining their composure which in turn assists them in performing better in their studies and examinations. Experts, in and around Porbandar as Patanjali Ashram, SCL, Xtrim Fitness care etc. have been holding week-long camps since 2018-19

Relief work:

The NSS/NCC Units also encourage the students to provide relief by way of food-packet distribution during times of incessant rains in the slum areas. The two NSS Units & NCC platoon have led from the front during the COVID 19 times. Whether it is Counseling the Villagers or spreading awareness in the remote and far-flung areas of Porbandar district or distributing Masks to the poor and needy; or serving specially prepared potions to the ailing and diseased – the students of our Institute have risen to the challenge and left no stone unturned.

Cleanliness Drive:

In keeping with the National mission *Swachch Bharat Shresth Bharat*, the institute conducts Cleanliness drives periodically round the year. Particularly, keeping 2nd of October in mind, the Institute organizes *Maha-Swachchata Abhiyaan* for the entire campus. A chart is prepared by the NSS/NCC Programme Officers and all the teachers and students are given a specific area to clean; following which in order to make **Gandhiji** – the father of the Nation relevant to contemporary times a **Maha-Quiz** has been arranged since the last five years to ensure the application of Gandhian thoughts and principles in our every-day life and living. The institution has always worked towards enhancing the infrastructural facilities for effective teaching and learning. The institution is well-equipped with a Morning Assembly Hall (Prayer Hall), 16 class-rooms, 02 well furnished staff rooms, Administrative Office, Network (Wi-Fi) connectivity with 05 routers, Campus Wi-fi (GTPL_PRB_11673), 01 Air conditioned Computer laboratory, 01 Air conditioned Beauty & Wellness/Pedicure & Manicure Laboratory, 01 Air conditioned Sewing Machine Operator Laboratory, 01 Air conditioned Digital Education and Learning Laboratory (DELL), 01 Food & Nutrition laboratory, Drinking water facilities, 01 AV Conference Hall with Internet/Wi-Fi Connectivity, Library with Book-Bank Facility and wi-fi connectivity, Hostel, Transport facility, Playground, Parking Area, Canteen facility, UPS etc. The management, every fortnight, discusses with Principal and the Principal in turn with HoDs for the required infrastructural facilities for effective teaching and learning.

In addition, the Institution in keeping with its philosophy of promoting Indian value systems/Vedic culture also has identified spaces for Vedam chanting and performing Havan. Both the spaces for Arya Kanya Gurukul – Gujarati and English Medium and Gurukul Mahila Arts and Commerce College have properly designed **Havan Kunds** wherein the students of the hostel perform *Yagna/Sandhya Havan* every morning and evening. Spaces have also been reserved for NSS and NCC administration. The campus also has on the lines of National Defence Academy set-up an Obstacle Course at the NCC-Playground, a 200 meter running track and Volley-ball court. Furthermore, the College has a separate track & field space, a Cemented Cricket-Pitch with Basket-ball and Volley-Ball courts. Equal weightage is given to both curricular and co-curricular activities. The Arya Kanya Vidyalaya Trust also has a **Bharat Mandir** (Temple of India) that houses, on 64 pillars, the engravings & busts of saints and seers of India since times immemorial; a **Tara-Mandir** (Planetarium) and a state-of-art **Museum & Vishwa Gurjari Library** in memory of Dr. Savitaben Mehta (the daughter of Pujya Bapuji), where students undertake educational tours; arrange Open-Classrooms, organize competitions and receive hands-on guidance from their teachers.

The Gurukul Mahila Arts and Commerce College Central Library is situated in a separate block within an area of 1500 sq.ft. It has a seating capacity of around 100 students. A special place has been allotted in the library for keeping the belongings of students before they enter the reading section. The Library has provision of 03 huge tables and 50 chairs for reading with good ventilation for the students. The Library has been computerized to access the books easily in the cupboards. Every year the library advisory committee works towards purchasing new titles and strengthening its activities.

This committee recommends the department-wise budget for purchase of books, periodicals and also conducts annual stock verification. The Library also has made provision for the book-bank scheme. Every year new/needy students become the beneficiaries of the facility. The library has also different sections such as Newspaper and journals & magazines; e-books are made available in the library.

In addition, the Library committee also organizes awareness sessions for the use of the Library; Online/Offline Library-Day celebrations are arranged, Book-Exhibitions on National days as Gandhi Jayanti are organized and various Memory-testing activities are scheduled all around the year to generate greater interest among the students and staff. Furthermore **the** College Central Library has been on the forefront in creating an ecosystem for Innovations among the students and staff. Among others the major **Innovative activities** conducted at and by the GMC-*Pustkalaya* are Quizzes on memorizing the Cover page of Classics; Book-Cover page making competition; One-minute Library-Game competition; Book-review competition; Rare-Books Exhibition; Cross-word Game competition. The Librarian also conducts regular counselling and LMS training sessions for the students to enable easy access to all the books and e-sources in the Library.

- 4. The institution has a well equipped Computer laboratory for the needs of students and faculty members.
- 5. The Administrative office and library are provided with internet connections.
- 6. Acharya software has been installed in the college office for Student Management & Accounting automation.
- 7. Administrative Office provides other facilities like Typing, Printing, Scanning and CD/DVD writing.
- 8. Library is equipped with Library Management Software (LMS) and internet facility.
- 9. The College Hostel has made provision of as many as 03 (three) Computer-Systems with wi-fi facility.
- 10. The entire campus is under 24 X 7 CCTV surveillance. In the College more than 40 cameras have been installed at strategic points to ensure the safety and security of all on the campus.

As such, the Institution has always given priority for the upgradation of its IT facilities. The highlight among others include (i) **Internet Connectivity**: The Institute has updated its Internet band-width speed from 30 MBPS to 50 MBPS to 100 MBPS in the last five years. In addition, the Insitute has taken the initiative of introducing 24/07 **Campus wi-fi** for all the students and teachers. (ii) **Computer Systems:** Of the 105 Computer Systems, 25 new systems have been purchased exclusively for SCOPE and Computer-based short-term courses in 2019-2020 (iii) **Licensed Version of TALLY ERP:** The Institution has purchased a lincensed version of TALLY-ERP for its internal accounting purposes. (iv) **Printing Devices:** The Institution has as many as 04 Printers/scanners and 01 Photo-copier to address the needs of the students and teachers. (v) **LCD Projectors:** The Institution has installed as many 09 LCD projectors in the classrooms/laboratories to supplement classroom teaching and learning. A mobile LCD projector, a Tablet and a Laptop along with speakers is always available for the students/teachers for conducting seminars/workshops/conferences (vi) **CCTV:** As many 39 Close-circuit cameras have been installed in the classrooms, laboratories and the campus area to address the safety and security aspects for girls.

Yes, the institution has a strategic/perspective plan in place. The college continuously strives hard for ensuring quality improvement and upliftment of students through education. The objectives of the College are driven by felicitating Govt./Institutional scholarships to the students, introducing short-term supplementary courses, introducing innovative teaching and learning resources through ICT and departmental evaluation. Internal committees conduct regular audit of academic activities for quality assurance. The academic programmes, co-curricular activities, sports & games activities, NSS, NCC, Saptadhara & Study Circle etc., contribute to enhancing the quality in all academic and administrative activities. The responsibility of developing and monitoring of quality assurance is entrusted to the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college which maintains quality sustenance in the academic, administrative and other activities. However, two activities stand out i.e., the study circle and saptadhara activity that is carried out every fortnight. An Academic calendar is chalked out before the previous term/month comes to a close and then when the new term/month commences the teaching staff ensures that every activity as stated in the calendar (department-wise) is executed with utmost sincerity. Finally during the Institute's Annual Programme the students who have participated outstandingly are felicitated with Gold-Medals/Awards/ Shields/Certificates by the Trustees/Chief-Guests/well-known personalities for academic excellence. This integrated activity helps in shaping the students to not merely develop their latent talents and also adds to the development of the student's total personality.

The institution has a long term planning for the growth and development that is reflected in its Perspective Plan. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college takes initiatives in the preparation of the perspective plan. Quintessentially, the following institutional bodies have been set up for the effective functioning of the college:

- Policies: Regarding usage of various laboratories; computer-systems, Library, Sports equipments appropriate Policies have been framed and displayed in the concerned display-boards.
- Administrative setup: The College as a grant-in-aid Institution abides by the Government framework. However, till 2022 in the absence of regular administrative staff, appointments had been made by the Trust. Recently a Junior Clerk has been appointed. He is assisted by 02 Trust appointed Junior Clerks and 01 Accountant.
- Appointment and service rules, procedures: The College adheres to the guidelines framed by the Commissioner of Higher Education (CHE), Government of Gujarat. Post-advertisement, CHE-Portal (https://www.rascheguj.in/) invites online-applications which post the due date are taken-up for scrutiny and verification. Finally Interviews are scheduled and conducted by the host institution. Post Selection the Appointment orders are issued immediately by the concerned Trust. Once the candidate joins, the Principal initiates the process of securing approvals both from CHE and the affiliating University.

The AKG-Organogram has the **Provost** as the Head of the Organization. It is under his supervision that all the other Units function which includes among others the Arya Kanya Gurukul-Gujarati Medium, Arya Kanya Gurukul-English Medium Schools, Gurukul Mahila Arts & Commerce College, the Campus Administration, the Heads of various Tasks Forces, the Trust Office and the Bhojnalaya. The **Provost** works hand-in-hand with the **Financial advisor** for various approvals and budgets. All round the year **zoom-meetings** are held by the **Trustees** for consensus on various academic, curricular, co-curricular and civil projects on the campus.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Answer:

- (A) Performance Appraisal System (PAS) is an important mechanism to ensure quality orientation and evaluation among the teaching and administrative staff.
 - The Arya Kanya Gurukul group of Institutions has also developed its PAS report which forms the basis for increments and promotions.
 - Marks are alloted under various categories/sections Personal Credentials (65); Contribution in Knowledge Production (40); Enhancement in Classroom Learning (75); Participation in Extra-Curricular Activities (57); Degree of Integration to AKG's Vision & Philosophy (63). Out of a total of 300 marks, a minimum of 200 marks would be requirement to be eligible for increment/promotion.

In addition, the following points are kept in mind:

- Degree of sincerity in implementing the Academic Calendar.
- Confidential reports of Principal and HoDs.
- Quality of teaching learning process.
- AQAR report and IQAC participation in orientation and training programmes.

- Research and publications of articles in journals and books
- Participation in National and International seminars and conferences.
- Students' feedback on Teachers. After receiving the outcome of performance appraisal report of the staff by the Management, the self-appraisal reports are studied through a SWOT analysis. Thus, adequate measures are taken to improve quality of teaching learning process.
- (B) The following Welfare measures are effective at Gurukul Mahila Arts & Commerce College:
- (i) Faculty Training programmes are periodically conducted for the teaching and administrative staff.
- (ii) All leave facilities are provided as per government rules and regulations. Teaching staff is granted duty leave for participating in workshops, seminars and conferences. The visiting staff is also permitted to avail 12 CL in an academic year.
- (iii) The Trust provides Uniforms/Winter-wear during Diwali to all its Trust employees and distributes Dates on Holi festival. Mahabhoj is arranged on Navratri for all the employees of the Trust and educational institutions.
- (iv) The Trust releases increments to all its employees in the month of July every year.
- (v) Scholarships are provided to children of the employees to study in the Akg-Schools or College. However, among others the condition to be eligible for Scholarship is to have a BPL Certificate and be worthy of the same.

The College too on the last day of the term (before Diwali break) organizes the IQAC Term-End Meet and under the watchful care of the IQAC members all the staff members are felicitated with folders and files.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Answer:

- (A) The major resources and institutional funding / receipts are: Student's Admission fees, Nibhav Grant, Innovation Grant, Saptadhara, Finishing School grants and Seminar/Conference Registration Fees.
- (i) **Student's Admission fees**: The fee-structure of GMC is in keeping with the guidelines of the Government of Gujarat and Bhakta Kavi Narsinh Mehta University, Junagadh.. As the institution is primarily for Girls, no tuition fees are taken from the students. Minimal fees have to be paid at the beginning of each term and the Administrative Office goes up to the classrooms to collect the fees to avoid disruption of academic activity and long Queues.
- (ii) **Nibhav Grant**: The Commissioner of Higher Education (CHE) sanctions Nibhav Grant to Grant-in-Aid Colleges. Accordingly the Institution receives around 80 thousand rupees every year.
- (iii) **Innovation Grant**: The Knowledge Consortium of Gujarat has sanctioned Rs. 5000/- for encouraging Innovative practices in the College. A Training module too was arranged by KCG in the second half of the year. (iv) **Saptadhara Grant**: The Knowledge Consortium of Gujarat (KCG) used to allot Rs.5000 to Rs. 20000 annually for conducting Saptadhara activities. However these grants have not been released since the last 05 years.
- (v) **Finishing School Grants**: The Knowledge Consortium of Gujarat (KCG) allocates grants upto 1 lac for every batch of the Finishing School Programme.
- (vi) **Seminars & Conferences Registration Fees**: The institution also organizes seminars, workshops and faculty /student development training programmes. The Institution generates its own fund for the organization of Seminars, Faculty & Student-Development Programmes, and Workshops etc. A token registration fees of Rs. 300/- for students and 1000/- for teachers is kept for Seminar registration and allied expenses.

(B) Internal and External Audit:

- The Institution has been conducting Internal and External Audits on a very regular basis since the last five decades. The following are its particulars: The Arya Kanya Vidyalaya Trust management has appointed Ranapara & Co. as Internal Auditor to audit the accounts of the Trust, Schools, College Hostel and Gurukul Mahila College every year.
- The accountant of the office checks the receipts and payments and records the receipts in the Cash Book ledger on a daily basis.
- Receipts and payment vouchers of daily transaction are then checked by the internal auditor who then audits income and expenditure statement under various heads.
- After the Audit is finalized, the Auditor submits the audited statement to the management.
- The Honorary secretary on behalf of the management discusses and approves the audited statement in the General body meeting of the Trust.

- The last audit was done in the year 2022-23.
- On the other hand, External Audit is carried out by the Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education (CHE). External Audits have been completed till 2020 as of date.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Answer:

The institution had formed Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in the year 2007 as per guidelines of NAAC. The main aim and policy of IQAC are Quality Enhancement, Quality Encouragement and Quality Sustenance in all academic and administrative activities. IQAC takes care of academic aspects, such as curricular aspects, teaching learning process, evaluation, research, academic audit and extension of community activities.

Review of Teaching Learning Process by IQAC:

- 1. The IQAC meets the teaching staff and student class representatives periodically to discuss the need for adopting modern and innovative methods in teaching and learning processes.
- 2. Principal, HoDs, IQAC coordinator evolve strategies to enrich the required and updated curriculum based on the feedback obtained from students, PTA and Alumni interface meets every year.
- 3. Innovative teaching through audio visual aids has been introduced and adopted by many of the faculty members.
- 4. The Principal and HoDs get confidential report from CRs and students on the quality of teaching by the teaching staff.

Structures & methodologies of operations:

- 1. All in all, the 18 core committees have a minimum of two faculty members to a maximum of five members to execute various tasks in coordination with the Students' Council (whose members range from 50 to 60)
- 2. Only CRs are permitted to visit the Admin Office for various tasks of the students as Bus-Passes, Scholarship etc.
- 3. Term Fees are collected in the classrooms itself in keeping with the No-Queue policy.
- 4. Parents' Meet is arranged for the Hostel students every month.
- 5. The GMC-Hostel too has two Rectors with 12 Hostel Representatives (HRs) who coordinate with Class Representatives (CRs) in the organization of various programmes and events in the Institutions.

Learning Outcomes:

The above structures and methodologies have raised the performance bar of the students who are shining out in the University examinations and many of them have been felicitated at various levels including NGOs and

the Association of Teachers. All the above activities in teaching learning process have had a remarkable impact in improving quality assurance in teaching learning process.

The two examples of institutional reviews and implementation of teaching learning reforms facilitated by the IQAC are:

- (i) **Gurukuliyam** (Hands-on-learning & Experiential learning Methodology in action): Since 2022, Team GMC has initiated an **Expo-Fest** which includes among others procuring sponsorships, setting up stalls, interacting with probable stakeholders, identifying quality judges, coordinating with respective teammembers, assigning stall management roles & responsibilities, working-out the budget, preparation of brochure and promotional marketing. In the year 2022-23, over 20 stalls were installed by the students under faculty guidance and over 3000 parents, girl students (from the district schools & colleges) and citizens of Porbandar visited these stalls from 9.00 in the morning till late 6.00 in the evening. However, the highlight of the entire **Gurukuliyam event** was that everything was **efficiently** managed by the students alone. Right from welcoming the guests to conducting, coordinating & executing all the 20+ stalls, various committees displayed their skills with finesse and precision.
- (ii) **Term-End Interface Meets:** Since 2017, IQAC has made it mandatory to have Term-end Interface meets in which all the prominent members of the IQAC committee are present along with the College staff-members and students. This is an occasion wherein term-end report presentations are made by the Principal/coordinator/faculty and administrative staff-members; following which all the faculty members and students share their views one by one. Finally the IQAC members give their feedback and suggestions.

Answer:

Gurukul Mahila Arts & Commerce College, Porbandar is a Girls' College that has kept at the core the Vision/ Mission statement of **Women Empowerment** since the last six decades. All possible efforts are made to ensure that fair and equal treatment is meted out to all irrespective of colour, caste, creed, race or religion. Right from the moment a student enters the portals of the College; till the moment she leaves the Institution following her three-year study, a 360 degree integral effort is made through various study-circle (curricular) and *Saptadhara* (co-curricular) activities along with making provisions for ensuring the diligent application of all the facilities made available on the campus. For instance:

Measures for promotion of Gender Equity:

- The institution puts in sincere efforts to empower students on moral and ethical values through daily Prayer, Quiz, Positive News, Thought for the day and Weekly *Havan*.
- The Prayer committee interacts with students & organizes awareness sessions on various grievances related to gender so as to develop sensitization among students and solve their personal-social issues.
- Organization of talks on Anti-Ragging also sensitizes the staff and students. By conducting various awareness programmes like SDPs (Student Development Programmes), Environmental studies, Value Education, Leadership-development Programmes, Formation of Student Council, Faculty development Programmes, Self-defense Training Programmes et al., the staff and students are sensitized towards the issue of gender and socially relevant problems.
- A variety of programmes as Blood-Donation camps are organized in collaboration with various clubs such as Rotary club, Red Ribbon Club, Red Cross Society and NSS to make students understand their strengths and weaknesses.
- As many as 22 Memorandum of Understandings (MoUs) have been signed by the Institution with various NGOs and Educational Institutions/Universities for experiential learning and arrangement of guest/expert lectures to sensitize the students and staff with latest/updated information about teaching-learning methodologies.
- The Institution also arranges **Educational Tours** to various factories, Schools, Colleges and University departments to have a hands-on experience and gather information and statistics on the current gender parity observed in allied institutions.

Curricular Activities for promotion of Gender Equity & Sensitization:

• The Institution has been taking special care to introduce **Skill-based** academic courses under every department in the post noon session. From linguistic competence & proficiency, to experiential/hands-on learning the students are exposed to a range of skills that would empower and provide social equity. Students are provided training among others in the use of Computers, Wellness and Fitness, knitting and weaving to equip them with the necessary skills to face the challenges of life and living. Students are also sensitized to social issues through courses in Personality-Development, Journalism, Online/Offline expert talks on subjects ranging from Psychology (Mental Health) to Philosophy (Spiritual

health).

Co-Curricular Activities for promotion of Gender Equity & Sensitization:

• The Institution also takes care to ensure the holistic development of the students through the establishment of a number of platforms in the College. For instance, the Educational Movie Club, the Electoral Literacy Club, the Eco-Club among others provides the necessary space for the emotional and intellectual development of the students. Hand-in-Hand every department has been making efforts to encourage the students to participate in the Sports-week events, cultural events (Talent-Morning to Annual Programme); Departmental weeks (English, Hindi and Gujarati); activities organized by the GMC-Incubation Centre; Annual Expo-fest et al.

A. The following Institutional efforts/initiatives are being made to provide an inclusive environment:

- 1. **Open-Admission Policy**: The College has an Open-Admission policy irrespective of Caste, Creed, race or religion. AKG's founding father believed in empowering girls through Education.
- 2. **Cultural activities:** Talent-Morning, Independence & Republic Day and the College Annual Programme are the platforms for exhibiting the latent talent of aspirants. However, the Institution believes in promoting Indian culture and *Hindustani* performances that are in symphony with Vedic Value-systems. As a rule film music/dance performances are not permitted and emphasis is laid upon innovation and topicality.
- 3. Celebration of days and festivals: The students at GMC celebrate not only Independence/Republic Day, Teachers' Day, Gandhi Jayanti, National Youth Day, Womens' Day but the national/regional festivals such as *Janmashtami, Raksha Bandhan, Navratri, Dusshera, Deepawali, Makar-sankranti, Holi*, which indicate reverence for India's regional and cultural harmony.
- 4. **Linguistic Diversity**: The celebration of Hindi/Gujarati Week (*Hindi/Gujarati Saptaha*) in GMC is reflective of its linguistic harmony promotion on the campus. Students participate in Skits, News-Reading competitions, Quiz competitions, Poem recitations & Poem-writing competitions, PPT competitions, Memory Game, chart-making and essay writing competitions et.al.
- 5. Socio-Economic Diversity: NCC/NSS volunteers of the institute are instrumental in sensitizing the students about community services. The College has signed an MoU with various NGOs as the Youth Red-Cross Society, Asha Blood Bank, MIND over MATTER et al. which provide an opportunity for personality development and social harmony through a framework of friendship and service.

Best Practice No. 01:

- 1. Title of the Practice: Value Education through Study-circle Activity
- 2. Objectives of the Practice:
 - To foster value based education.
 - To prepare responsible and committed citizens.
 - To encourage practical spirituality
- 3. **The Context**: In an environment where human values and ethos are taking a backseat it is imperative that institutions of higher learning take the initiative and the responsibility of preparing citizens who understand that value systems alone in the long run would help them to traverse the trials and tribulations of life and living. Again, the founding father of our Institution Raj-Ratna Shreshthi Shri Nanjibhai Kalidas Mehta, a contemporary of Mahatma Gandhi and Rabindranath Tagore had visualized the College as a centre where

women of character and substance would be prepared for the nation. And therefore it is our prime institutional responsibility to ensure that students of this institute remain unfazed and unruffled by the changing winds of time. In addition, the Arya Kanya Gurukul Trust has all these eight decades maintained in its pristine form all the rites and rituals as *Yagnam*, *Yagnopavit* (Sacred-thread ceremony et.al) for all those who reside in the Hostel.

- 4. The Practice: 18 committees have been constituted for developing skill, knowledge and efficiency. Every fortnight our teachers through the Study-circle activities impart among others practical lessons of Value-based education through their respective subjects. These practices lead to inculcating a positive attitude & awareness about our glorious past; Indian heritage and history; national integration and developing a healthy relationship with our immediate environment. Consequently virtues of self-restraint, self-discipline, contentment, find ample space in their processes of learning. Students as Mentors/Class-representatives are encouraged to take up responsibility, which in turn creates a strong learning environment that enhances academic and curricular attainment and eventually develops students' social, cultural and interpersonal human values in keeping with Indian ethos and value-systems. The avenues for developing and fostering Value-based practices include among others (a) Morning Prayer (b) Yagna (Havan) (c) Veda Mantra recitation and (d) Yoga Meditation.
- 5. **Evidence of Success**: The Alumni & Parents more than often appreciate during interface meets how they miss Gurukul and its spiritual ambience. Parents too during PTA express their pride as their wards have been former students of Gurukul and that they have been successful in life solely on account of the value education imparted by the institution. Faculty members organize counseling sessions on value education periodically.
- 6. **Problems Encountered and Resources Required**: All problems were amicably resolved and all necessary resources were made available to the staff & students.

Best Practice No. 02:

- 1. Title of the Practice: Saptdhara (Seven Societies for Integral Education)
- 2. Objectives of the Practice:
 - To bring out the latent talent/Skill of the students.
 - To develop skills pertaining to Music & dance (Geet-Sangeet-Nritya dhara), theatre (Natya dhara), service (Samudayik seva dhara), knowledge (Gyana dhara), Creative writing (Sarjanatmak abhivyakti dhara), Yoga (Khel-kood yog vyayam dhara), Fine Arts (Rang-kala-kaushalya dhara).
 - To create greater market value of GMC students.
- 3. **The Context**: Integral/holistic development of the students is one of the objectives of education. And herein too students need to moulded and well-grounded in Indian value-systems keeping obviously the contemporary needs of the employment market in mind. And therefore, the Institution envisages a balanced growth that incorporates among others an appreciation of the Vedic practices and hand-in-hand, knowledge of Information technology through need-based computer courses. Quintessentially, the Institution offers: (i) The seven societies that conducts activities in keeping with Indian ethos and values (as stated in the Academic Calendar). (ii) 23 Short-term/add-on courses to sharpen among others their computer and linguistic skills.
- 4. **The Practice**: Every society/dhara has a faculty coordinator and a faculty member to coordinate the activities every term. 7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

The College is situated on the outskirts of Porbandar. The college offers under graduate programmes both in Arts and Commerce stream to the aspiring girls of the district. At present there are **Six** departments (English, Hindi, Gujarati, Economics, Home-Science and Commerce-Gujarati & English Medium). Besides, the college also offers **05 UGC-NSQF Courses** and **Six Babasaheb Ambedkar Open University Courses** (in the distance mode). Every year a large number of rural girls take admission in different courses and the college makes it sure to provide all the basic facilities to students as per the guidelines of the Trust, the University and the State Government. The College always aspires to help poor students so that they can overcome their academic hurdles. The college has established a **BOOK BANK** Facility for needy students who can avail free books on yearly basis. The college also undertakes several initiatives to sensitize students to gender equity, energy conservation measures, inclusiveness, human values etc. Keeping all these in view, the college organizes several programmes such as lectures, talks, workshops, seminars/webinars, sports week and over 20+ activities under NSS and NCC units. The college always ensures participation of students to sensitize them to social issues.

2. The performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its priority:

The College gives priority to promote education among the rural students of the region. Keeping holistic development of the students in view, the college encourages all to participate in extracurricular activities (NSS, cultural, literary and sports societies) so that they cope up with students of the main stream. Besides, the college also organizes several talks, seminars, workshops etc., to apprise students to the topical national and international issues.

Academic and Research achievements:

I Academic Achievements:

The College attempts to foster diverse all-round growth including teaching, learning and evaluation.
